The Target Range Area Homeowners Association, Inc. was formed pursuant to the Montana Nonprofit Corporation Act in 1980. The Mission Statement for the Association states the goals of TRHOA:

- To promote the Target Range School boundary area of Missoula as a rural residential area of the first quality.
- 2. To maintain and improve the environment, esthetic qualities, property values, public improvements and facilities, and such other features of the Target Range area of Missoula County as are desirable to continuance of the area as a rural residential district of the first quality.
- 3. To sponsor and support public and civic projects and programs consistent with the other purposes of the corporation.
- 4. To engage in any other lawful activity.

Since 1980 when TRHOA came into being, the definition of the term "Homeowners Association" has evolved into meaning a governing body that sees that all the property owners abide by the covenants of a subdivision. A modern "Homeowners Association" has the authority to levy fees and impose fines. The Target Range Homeowners Association has never had, nor does it seek, such authority over the residents of Target Range (area within the Target Range School boundaries). Additionally, TRHOA has come to include all residents in Target Range. One does not have to pay membership dues to come to and participate in General Meetings or to receive this newsletter or informational e-mails. Irrigation Time is Coming

Water is the life blood of all land. Target Range is blessed with a very old irrigation ditch system that delivers this life blood, turning semi-arid land into extremely productive fields. All that is required is a reasonable amount of husbandry.

Everyone with water rights has the right to travel the ditch system to clean or do repair work to insure delivery of water. To maintain good relations, advise a neighbor of plans to enter his/her property to work on a ditch. Many newer owners may not know that you have this right and may need a cordial explanation.

Although the ditch rider employs a crew to clean the ditches each spring, anything you can do to help is welcome. Clearing branches and leaves ahead of time aids in how fast the crew gets the cleanup done. The ditch rider is only responsible for delivery of water down the main supply ditches. Most of the small laterals and supply ditches are private and maintenance responsibility is entirely up to the users. Coordinate with your neighbors for the yearly cleaning and maintenance work in preparation for the water coming in. Historically we have seen the ditch water

come around May 1st.

Cooperate with neighbors regarding regulating flow. Flooding a neighbor or in any way polluting water with chemicals or trash is not acceptable. When mowing next to the ditches, please be sure to throw clippings away from the water. Please remove garbage if found floating in the ditch.

Our ditch water is a valuable resource that grows crops better than colder and more mineralized water from our wells. Make use of it and help keep Target Range beautiful.

Weeds

Our ditch system helps weeds spread. In the past ten to fifteen years leafy spurge has invaded the main ditch banks and threatens to invade all adjacent land. This is probably the worst invasive plant of all weeds in our area.

Learning what new spurge plants look like and thoroughly digging them out in their first year helps curtail the plants' spreading. Once this plant has two or more years' growth, the root system is too deep and extensive to dig out. If you need help, contact the Missoula County Weed District.

From Larry Nagy: TRSWD announces a major effort to increase our monitoring of all water resources that affect our way of life. TRSWD is creating a board of individuals with extensive knowledge in water resources. The following is an extract from one of the upcoming articles for our TRSWD Newsletter:

WATER WATER EVERYWHERE ... JUST BENEATH MY FEET!

Longtime residents of the Orchard Homes and Target Range districts (OH/TR) have been blessed with an aquifer that has for decades provided the water necessary for their homes, farms, ranches and other businesses. Long term viability of this resource should not be taken for granted.

Sometime in the 1970's the Geology Department of the University of Montana embarked on an effort to quantify the amount of water available for consumption by withdrawal from the Missoula Aquifer. This study looked at the geology of the Missoula Valley and the different sources of water that recharge the aquifer; including the Clark Fork River and tributaries that discharge directly to the Clark Fork. One of the main conclusions from this assessment was that the aquifer does not have as much volume readily available as was previously assumed.

Much has changed in the Missoula Valley since the 70's. The increase in population results in an increase in housing in many areas of the valley that were previously dominated by agriculture. This "Urban Creep" comes at a cost to all who live in OH/TR, not only monetarily through taxes and connection fees, but in loss of control of the water resource.

Target Range Sewer and Water District Benefits

Many people may bemoan the Sewer & Water District charge on their taxes, but there is a very bright side if you run into septic problems and need to replace or improve your system.

We personally had had some problems in the past couple years with our system backing up when used heavily. We finally faced the reality that we had to replace our old system. After obtaining the required permits, we contacted several good, approved contractors for bids and selected a great one who lives in the neighborhood.

The bright side of this very disruptive project was that we were able to receive a grant from the TRSWD for \$5000 towards our expenses.

The District is still offering free water tests. Everyone should take advantage of this service. It is worth at least two years of the TRSWD tax!

Spring is in the air and that means renewed activity throughout the park. Soon we will hear the crack of the bat at the Little League, Mavericks, and Fast Pitch fields. Summer will also bring Cyclocross events and, of course, equestrian camps, clinics, and competitions. The Horse Park's season officially kicks off on May $4^{\rm th}$ with a fun Pet Run.

Finally, with the help of Jackson Lee and PTOL, the Stewardship Committee has secured a Trail Improvement Grant. These monies will be used to construct a proper trailhead at the new parking lot. It will include maps and signage and an ADA compliant connector trail to the main trail. Other trail improvements throughout the park are included. Please remember if you're in the horse area of the park, horses have the right of way.

Hope to see you out in the park! It is there for everyone.

LEARNING WITH MEANING

There is a wonderful educational organization that moved into your neighborhood and we would like to introduce ourselves!

Learning with Meaning, Inc. (LWM) is an educational non-profit offering several experiential learning programs for youth. eNDVR, our homeschool enrichment program, offers classes for students from K-5th grade. Aspire, our accredited 6th-12th grade school, focuses on experiential and self directed learning. Our K-12th grade summer camps bring hands-on STEM and outdoor learning experiences to local children and youth.

We currently run our programs out of both our downtown location and on the LWM Land, located behind Target Range school on McCauley Butte. With tribal permission, we call the butte Smlkwsšna (sml-kwil-shih-nah). The LWM founder and LWM Land owner allows LWM to lease this 140 acres of land for our school programs, home school support classes, community programs, and summer camps.

Would you like to use the LWM land for your group, class, program, school, organization or business? LWM offers a land use program where you can utilize our land for a base fee depending on group size. The LWM Land is not currently open to the general public and requires advanced planning.

Dark Sky International

On our recent trip away from Missoula, we were joined by one of our daughters' family which included two of our grandchildren. Every evening, we watched beautiful sunsets as the sun disappeared into the Pacific Ocean, followed by a shorter period of dusk due to being located closer to the equator. The children asked why the moon and stars looked different and in new and strange locations compared to home. For instance... why the moon, in its quarter stage was upside down instead of horizontal, and why Orion, which could be easily seen, had stars coming down from the angular group of three from his belt. I explained that number one: we had changed our location on the globe, and two: there are fewer people where we were and thus less distracting light casting a glow upwards that lessens our view of the night sky.

As a member of Dark Sky International, I am constantly reminded of our decreasing view of the night skies over our Missoula valley. As I sit on my back porch at night hoping to view my favorite constellations, meteor showers, super moons, and occasional aurora displays, I am dismayed by the restrictive glow washing out those images. As a child, I remember being amazed when trying to spot passing satellites.

What can you do to keep our skies dark? We can find solutions. Also TRHOA has access to programs through DarkSky. Let's work together! Please visit DarkSky.org

MISSOULA RURAL FIRE DISTRICT NEWS

The Missoula Rural Fire District (MRFD) hopes this message finds you well. Recently MRFD has undergone a change in leadership, as Chief Chris Newman has retired after 27 years of service to the Missoula community. Former Assistant Chief, Paul Finlay, is now the Fire Chief. Kirk Paulsen has been appointed to the role of Assistant Chief, and Cory Horsens is the new Deputy Chief.

We have been busy! Last year MRFD saw a 4.3% increase in calls compared to 2022. We've already (through January 2024) responded to 29.6% more calls than last year at this same time.

MRFD is continuing to pursue international accreditation with the Commission on Fire Accreditation International, which would make us the first department in Montana to achieve this goal.

We are continuing to research and determine the best location(s) for new station(s) to better serve the communities we serve. Station #1 at South Avenue and Reserve Street is 61 years old and we have drastically outgrown it. Moving forward, we will continue to assess the needs of the residents we serve and continue to work to meet the growing needs of the community.

Lastly, we at MRFD encourage all members of the public to sign up for reverse 911, as this will alert neighborhoods and members of the public of emergencies in their area.

Mountain Home

Mountain Home (MH) was started in 2000 by a labor and delivery nurse, Laura Snyder, who was alarmed by the number of teenage mothers without a safe place to live with their newborn babies. Laura brought together a group of local philanthropic women to address this crisis. One of these women, Bonnie Hamilton, generously donated her home on South Avenue to answer that need. From these humble beginnings 23 years ago, MH has steadily built upon the passion and vision of our founders, growing in breadth and depth to respond to increasing demand for our services.

Today we offer a Residential Program in that same 6-bedroom home with an additional 5 supportive living apartments; an onsite licensed mental health center with case management and therapy for both mothers and children; a supportive education/employment program that ensures mothers can support their families and establish stable careers; a community center that offers 200+ events ranging from financial literacy to family wellness and parenting support; and an onsite trauma-informed childcare center for youth ages 0-3. Through this holistic model of care for mothers and children, MH strives to strengthen community, two generations at a time.

To better serve our community, MH recently purchased the former Hillside Manor Health and Rehabilitation facility off 23rd Street in Missoula. This five acre property provides MH the opportunity to expand our childcare for up to thirty-two kiddos, serve up to fifty families through our residential program, and increase our compassionate care for mothers with a history of substance use disorder, helping families remain secure and in recovery. All of this while offering beautiful green outdoor space to encourage development through play in our children's programs and further facilitate healthy and holistic mental health for the whole family.

Target Range Birds -Common and Rarer

One of the things that makes watching our feathered friends so interesting in the Target Range neighborhood is that no two years seem quite the same. Starting a few winters after the soccer fields were installed, geez, did the Canada geese discover it! This winter it was often visited by flocks in excess of three hundred birds foraging through the shallow snow for the blades of grass below. Canada geese enjoy a meal of lawn about as much as any dairy herd, and offer the same benefit of rapidly releasing comparable nutrients back to the landscape. The soccer fields were probably particularly crowded with geese this year because our mild winter often left but a skiff of snow, plus plenty of open pond and river water nearby for the flocks to loaf on at other hours.

But we also sometimes host extremely rare visitors. About five years ago a single male Baikal teal, a Russian-bred and obviously confused duck, showed up in the ditch system near Blue Mountain Road, causing a sensation amongst avid "Twitchers" (as the British like to call bird watchers). Hundreds of people from across the nation made a pilgrimage in hopes of spying the clownish little two pounder that had previously only been found four times in the lower 48. I even got a glimpse of him before he flapped off to somewhere else (probably still going the wrong way).

Target Range Foundation Seeks Support in Rebuilding Target Range School Basketball Hoops

Target Range Foundation's mission is to create an awareness of and encourage private financial support for funding opportunities at Target Range School.

This spring we have partnered with the Target Range School administration to demolish the current six basketball hoops in the court closest to 40th Ave and replace them with four high-quality hoops and poles that are at regulation height. We will also reseal the asphalt and install inserts in the grass area nearby so our students can enjoy a volleyball net during recess. The current hoops, backboards and poles are worn out and the pole heights vary between 9.5 – 10.5 feet. The current asphalt is wearing down and causing safety hazards. The school has secured an excavator and paving company to help with this work. We plan to finish the project in September 2024.

This project will positively impact our Target Range students and families who recreate at Target Range School outside school hours. The total cost for the project is \$30,000 and we have raised \$14,550. Red Hen Farm and Orchard, located at 3803 Spurgin Road, is owned by Julianna and Greg Peters. Our farm raises fruit, garlic, and a few veggies using organic and resource-conserving practices. Our sweet little roadside stand boasts of all types of berries and tree fruit picked at peak ripeness - specifically, strawberries, raspberries, apples, peaches, plums, blueberries, apricots, and lesser-knowns such as haskaps, currants, and gojiberries. We also sell plant starts early in the season, and consult people on growing fruit in the backyard and garden.

Check out our website and social media sites in order to discover u-pick opportunities throughout the summer. Our farm stand is self-serve, open every day (almost) once strawberries are in season. We also hold a variety of learning opportunities and experiences at the farm.

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Missoula's premier apple and raspberry U-Pick orchard, **Green Bench Orchard**, is located near the end of South Avenue West at 4701. Fred and Geri Stewart had their eighth U-Pick harvest in 2023. About half of the trees are the Honeycrisp variety, with the remaining split among Liberty, Spartan, Goodland, Goodmac, Haralson, Kerr Crab and Wealthy varieties. You'll find something for almost any taste or use, from eating fresh to pies, sauce or cider.

Apple harvest begins about the middle of August and lasts until the middle of October. The trees are all semi-dwarf size for easy picking on your family outing. No ladders needed, we supply the bags and containers and you pick the freshest USDA Certified Organic fruit available.

2023 was also the eighth year for U-Pick raspberries, with Boyne and Nova summer red varieties. Harvest usually begins early July running until August. Due to the increased demand for raspberries, we expanded our beds by 50% in 2018, but it is still hard to meet the demand for U-Pick raspberries.

Green Bench Orchard is USDA Certified Organic and does not use chemicals in the orchard, keeping you and the environment healthy. Find us on Facebook for hours and availability @Green Bench Orchard. 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For 18 years **Turner Farms** has been deeply rooted in the Orchard Homes neighborhood. With the diminishing of farms in Missoula, the Turners have made it their mission to open their farm to the community so kids know what local food tastes like and what a farm looks (and smells) like! You will find local schools and youth organizations visiting the farm often for educational tours. The Turners also host 6 weeks of summer farm camps for children ages 6-14 years old.

Turner Farms is a diversified farm offering a wide array of vegetables and fruits and their sustainably-raised, grass-fed beef, pork, and their signature lamb meat. (All raised between 3rd and 7th Street.) Jon and Erin (Eisenman) Turner began the farm in 2006 with their three young sons. Today, their sons all have a role in the farm. Their oldest has come back after college to manage the livestock operation.

TURNER FARM STORE, a renovated 1930's barn (original to the property), is open year round providing in-season produce, farm-raised meat, and chicken, duck and geese eggs. New this year, Turner Farms has farm-made bone broth made from animals and vegetables all raised at the farm! The store also offers lots of other local or small batch items. The store is set up as a self-serve stand allowing it to be open every day from dawn to dusk! Swing in and enjoy a little nostalgic trip back to the days of the ol' country stores!

Turner Farms hosts various Farm Markets with other local vendors at their farm and, of course, they open their farm in October to the entire public for their annual Pumpkin Festival. The farm also offers an event-space for the public to rent for meetings, parties, and gatherings.

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Tayer's Gardens, owned by Dennis Tayer, is located at 2548 River Rd. Dennis owns and operates a lawn service and snow removal business. He currently is selling grass-finished beef, apples, and potatoes. He can be found either in the garden or at one of the following markets: Clark Fork River Farmers Market (May – Oct), Orchard Homes Farmers Market (June – Sept), Missoula Valley Winter Market (Nov – Apr), and Orchard Homes Winter Market (Jan – Mar). Farm produce includes raspberries, rhubarb, carrots, potatoes, kohlrabi, plums, apricots, pears, peaches, pie cherries, squash (winter and summer), peppers (hot and sweet), tomatoes, cabbage, tomatillos, corn, radishes, green onions, beets, leeks, and many other garden vegetables. Dahlias, peonies, and gladioli add color to his garden. Dennis is one of the founding members of the new Blue Mountain Growers Co-op.

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Tower Gardens, (Kari Brittain) located on the N.E. corner of Tower & 7th Streets, is busy preparing for the 2024 growing season. The year-round Farm Store is located in the barnyard of 3340 S. 7th Street W., featuring local organically grown inseason produce, eggs, and items made from the gardens/farms of your neighbors (Fruits & Vegetables, Jams, Honey, Pickled Foods, Wool, Photo Cards, Plants, etc.). It's open dawn to dusk. Follow the Tower Garden sunflower signs to the farm store door! Contact Kari at 406-370-0375 for details. Eat well. Eat local!

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Frank's Little Farm is run by Sean McCoy, Prairie Wolfe and their two children, Cassius and Orlagh. This will be our eleventh season of urban farming in the River Road neighborhood. We are proud to be one of the farms continuing to uphold the agricultural traditions of the Target Range area. For decades now the western portions of Missoula have been growing food and hay in the nutrient rich soil along the river.

Frank's Little Farm strives to offer a wide variety of produce using sustainable agricultural methods. We sell plants and produce directly to the public through our roadside farm stand on the corner of Curtis and Wyoming, just off Third Street. The farm stand is open every day of the week beginning in May, and closes on the first of November.

We can also be found at the Missoula Farmer's Market at the XXXX's in the spring, selling garden plants.

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Orchard Homes Icelandics and Organics on Seventh Street is run by
Brooke Martin and Kent Sugden along
with their daughter Adelaide.

Operating on one of the remaining historic farmsteads, they grow Icelandic sheep, chickens, and heritage- and openpollinated produce from a ~3000 square foot irrigated garden and small orchard. Orchard Homes Icelandics uses a conservation farming model to maximize healthy organic practices and restore the land using native plants for erosion control, and managed grazing and irrigation for weed control. They have spent close to 20 years selecting openpollinated, Native and heirloom seeds for cold hardy and Missoula hardy stock including the tomatoes "Sugden Gold" and "Sweet Adelaide", as well as Montana selected Painted Mountain corn and Missoula selected hardy peppers.

Produce is now seasonally available through Orange St. Food Farm (grass-fed lamb), Joseph's Coat (wool), Orchard Homes Farmers Market, and the Spurgin Farmstand (hours vary).
